HOW TO PRAY IN THE MANNER OF A VOLUNTAS DEI

Firstly, it is your total person who is in prayer before God and this is completely in the moment of your life. All seems easier when love is mixed in!

At every moment of the day you have the opportunity to be the good news for the neighbor.

To pray is an act of humility that places me before God and my neighbor. Each little thing or small gest can become a prayer since there is associated compassion: the compassion of Jesus.

Through your attitudes of life: for example your look, your smile is in itself a prayer and at the same time a way of evangelizing. You become a witness of Jesus by your whole life.

In the morning, I take precious time for the Lord. I have the good fortune of doing adoration in the chapel of the rectory. I place myself in the disposition to welcome His love: Jesus shows Himself in a secret and discreet way to my heart in order to be His heart to carry in daily life each day.

And the Mass is the greatest prayer, the prayer of Jesus that asks the Father to gather all to Himself to give life, the resurrection. And in doing this, Jesus remits the world to His Father and to our Father.

Without forgetting Mary is united to her Son through the Holy Spirit.

A friend of mine said to me: « What you cry out is stronger than what you say.»

Jesus, I offer to you who I am, my heart, my personhood, and I ask of you to make of me your instrument of peace, love and hope in today's world. This is what dwells within me that makes a difference in the art of being Voluntas Dei.

Our family, committed to the Voluntas Dei Institute, aspires to the perfection of love based upon the witness of the Christian life.

Consecrated life as a couple is realized through the public commitment of the evangelical counsels: poverty, chastity and obedience.

POVERTY

Our poverty, as a project of partnership, is based upon:

- 1. The commandment of love.
- 2. The sacraments.
- 3. The correct orientation of our desires concerning the things of this world and material riches.
- 4. God is the ultimate and true riches.
- 5. To share material and spiritual goods, not by constraint by through love.
- 6. To see in each person the human face of the Lord Jesus.
- 7. To do the will of God and not make decisions based upon logic or human judgment.
- 8. Jesus became poor and we must not be slaves to wealth.
- 9. We live modestly: we have a house of 52 square meters in a low social area.
- 10. Our monthly revenue is the minimum salary and when we take out the participation for health, there remains only 520.000 pesos (\$286.00 CA) to meet our basic needs each month.

CHASTITY

As a couple, we live fidelity and unselfish love. The purity of body is possible if there is truly the purity of spirit and heart and this occurs also through the mortification of the senses. But, without the help of God it is not possible to achieve this virtue.

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Prayer is a conversation or a sincere dialogue that brings us closer, establishes and ratifies our relationship with Him.

The quality of prayer marks without doubt our daily life and our relationships with others since it underscores our actions.

That is why in this world more and more agitated and uncertain where time is always

scarce, it is essential that the Voluntas Dei not neglect his/her relationship with God through prayer in order to be truly the salt and the light of the world at this present hour.

From my experience, the two are certainly a daily attitude that through our spirituality we live as an essential pillar of our being Voluntas Dei. But, it is also true that it is not easy being a person of prayer.

At the same time, I can also say that it is not easy being a community of prayer especially when our difficulties « enter with us into the chapel » as a determining factor of our spirit and our will.

That is why it is difficult to make prayer and meditation a true encounter, a privileged place favorable to encountering God, a space to admire His face, to hear His voice and to express our prayers and gratitude.

It is also true that prayer and meditation claiming to be in the forefront of our spiritual and personal life requires a constant effort.

We must put forward something of our very self in order to pray since it is no just a matter of kneeling as God is always ready and attentive, but our being has a need of an involvement permitting it to prepare the spirit and to make of real life in the daily moment, the good and the bad, a true prayer and not one of complaint or meaningless words. Consequently, through our prayer we live also in a process of daily conversion.

In light of this, Father Parent encourages us and tells us that all prayer is good, and effectively it is the same whether it is difficult to do, alone or in community. Prayer and meditation are a moment of encounter with God. Thus, put something of ourselves forward in order to pray while knowing that we are right at the good instant to pray in the present moment and say to Jesus: «Look, Lord, who I am and I ask Him what I can do? » It is a way among many others in which he has shown us that prayer and meditation are a personal encounter with an « I » and a « You. »

It is like walking and slowing down the step always looking at the one who walks beside me while sharing a few words on what is happening. The more we look at who is walking with us, better still, when we walk always aware of their presence, our walk will be different and we will be continuously in the presence of God and we will be able to say that our very life is a prayer that makes us people of prayer.



Daily prayer and meditation translate into the strength needed to realize our ideal. All prayer is good and there is so much good at the interior of each person. There are many forms of prayer, a lot to support me many times, one or the other complementing each other and interchangeable says Father Parent.

Just as it is always good to encounter someone that you love, it is always good to pray and each time it is a good moment for him/her whether he/she is happy or sad.

MY PERSONAL PRAYER

From my experience, I carry out my prayer through three aspects: my daily activity, another through my liturgical and sacramental life in the Church and thirdly my space of intimate encounter with the Lord.

Prayer in my daily life I achieve also in two moments, the first when I thank the Lord for having allowed me to live in His presence, for giving me the power to contemplate Him through His actions and His creatures.

I thank God and the Holy Virgin for having given me the opportunity to see that a sick person sees in me a mediator in order to receive in fullness the divine mercy that relieves the pain and fills with hope their world of suffering.



In assuming being of service, I pray with the person firstly through the needs of the same patient, and secondly, as a witness and accompanying person in prayer, I accompany this sick person while directing him/her so that he/she does not fall into despair but that he/she has recourse to prayer as one of the means to be in the presence of God.

The other moment of my experience of prayer is in my sacramental life. This is no longer in my daily life, but in my life as Church, as community when I feel myself taking part and being a part of this Church our mother and protector. This phase of experience realizes itself in the daily encounters carried out in particular in the Eucharist, but also in other religious calls like the recitation of the rosary, evening prayer, triduums as well as during celebrations, etc.

And finally, the other moment which is also the phase that gratifies me the most is the intimate encounter with God in the Blessed Sacrament or through my personal and meditated prayer. In the morning in asking for the presence of God and the gentle company of the Virgin Mary during activities to be undertaken, and at night, thank you for what they allowed me to achieve and to forgive me for what has been left undone. There are critical moments where indisputably I seek the Lord and my Holy Mother Mary through prayer, sick friends, family crisis etc. with the assurance that their support will give me the strength to face the difficult moments.

Be that as it may, thanks to my experience of Voluntas in regarding the presence of God, may my life be a prayer, a prayer in order to surmount all in life.

MESSAGE ON PRAYER AND MEDITATION ON THE WORD OF GOD

One of the key elements of the Voluntas Dei spirituality is prayer or meditation on the Word of God (first 5). They help us to develop a life of intimacy with the Lord that we cannot not neglect even if we are involved in thousands of daily concerns since a life without prayer and meditation on the Word of God is like a body without life, since, without doubt, it is what nourishes and energizes our spirituality.



For the tasks of each day, one can easily forget to connect oneself with God, and sometimes even be tempted to think that this is a easy thing that necessitates little time and can be done as the day unfolds. However, it is there where resides our greatest error.

Firstly, because it is this that stimulates and strengthens our day and when we are right in the midst of the concerns of our era that take our time there is no longer place for what, fundamentally, we have relegated to later. Thus, in order to avoid losing completely our life of intimacy with God, the loss to taste what it realizes, it is necessary every day to submit our human will and to consecrate time for prayer and meditation on the Word of God in order to help us certainly to face the obstacles and the concerns of the day.

In my life of prayer and meditation on the Word of God, many times, notably at the beginning of the day, I have been confronted with the temptation mentioned above. But I apply the same recipe of sacrificing my human will in order to forget the things that I have to do during the day in order to stop for an instant to nourish and strengthen myself.

I have sometimes experienced a spiritual aridity, not having any strength, inclination or motivation, and I have not had any other choice but to return to the source since the cooling of the heart does not have any other reason than that of forgetting and neglecting prayer and the meditation on the Word of God.

And being a priest, I have need more than most of this proximity and intimacy with God in order to have the strength to pick up people who have fallen, the light to guide those who are lost, the wisdom to guide those who are bewildered and the energy to counter the evil that comes so often my way.

It is through the power of prayer and meditation on the Word of God that I receive the strength, the light, the wisdom and the energy that I need.

I invite you to watch always this closeness of intimacy with God by taking moments of the day to pray and meditate on the Word of God. This is our strength: to pray and meditate on the Word of God and the enemy will go far from us. May God bless you.

PRAYER

This action is the elevation of the spirit toward God, not considered as a reading nor as a monologue but always as a dialogue.

To pray is to raise on high those things that distract us (work, studies, daily life, etc.)
To pray is to receive what God wants to give us. It is to open ourselves to forgiveness that He offers us and to receive what He offers us.

Prayer is to receive God Who prays within us since it is He Who has commenced it, pursues it and ends it. The human person returns to his/her own story that God allows to take place freely.

Consequently, this awareness entails a re-evaluation in order to determine time for prayer. There is necessary a personal deepening for it is the human person alone with his/her God.

We must find a style of personal prayer for ourself: in order to find a bit of hope, to find silence, calm and to resist the impulses of today's world and to be vigilant as well as to live an intense interior life that is not superficial.

We must be aware that the human person has been created to know, love and serve God. We must pray in order to hear the word of God that is our nourishment.

We pray to learn how to dialogue with others, to give a Christian meaning to our criticism, to forgive, to excuse and to know how to ask for what people living in constant renewal do in order to seek always what is pleasing to God.

To see God acting in our time today, we must discover the meaning of the Cross and to accept the meaning of suffering, and that is why we must pray. It is to be able to do the will of God.

Consequently, we must pray in order to know, judge and eliminate the faults that we have, and not to be blinded by reality in order to be freed from slavery, fear and to be faithful to the heritage received.

We must pray in order not to lose the joy of our lives and to live happily.

The fullness of the Christian life requires my silence before God and the fullness of interior silence, Luke 21:36 « Stay awake, praying at all times, for the strength to survive all that is going to happen and to stand with confidence before the Son of Man. ». Note 14. 32.



In order to live Christian love and to forgive, it is necessary to pray. Prayer does not allow isolating or marginalizing oneself from life. To the contrary, it is the link that joins us to life. To pray gives glory to God. It makes us Christians

TO PRAYER WITH LIFE

For all of the Voluntas Dei members, like for all Christians, there exist religious practices that are fundamental in order to persevere on the route that we have chosen to follow Christ. This becomes more widespread in a world that has a lot of offers that invite us to take different routes and pathways that the Lord offers us.

For us, as Voluntas Dei members, we are called to live our consecration to Christ in a secularized world. This is an essential element and it is not by chance that Father Parent gave as the first point of the first 5 of our Voluntas Dei spirituality the permanent culture of prayer and meditation. Prayer is the channel through which I can maintain a life of intimacy and close friendship with a faithful friend who chose me one day and called me to follow Him and to serve Him as a priest.

As a member of a secular Institute, there are challenges in respect to a life of prayer in the world, a world that is fast and where all exercise many professions that make it difficult to have appropriate and sustained moments of prayer.

But, outside of all of these situations, as a celibate layman, I have learned that it is possible to pray and to meditate from two dimensions that I think are important: 1) from the example of Mary who gave herself unique moments to be alone with the



Master; 2) from the example of Martha who made of her work and service a prayer to God.

In brief, each Voluntas Dei, and why not, all Christians who want to maintain a close relationship with Christ, should cultivate these two dimensions of prayer as appropriate means of union with Christ.

But especially, we are aware that as committed laymen, the greatest testimony that we can give to the world is to know how to make prayer an integral and essential part of all that we do, but also, to make life a prolonged prayer to God in which we give thanksgiving unceasingly for having chosen us in order that we may be His friends and become participants in His grace.
