Who is Jesus for Me??

On June 29, the Church celebrated the feast of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, witnesses and pillars of our Church. This feast gave me the opportunity to share a number of reflections with the Oblates united to mark the celebration of the foundation of their Institute. I would like to share these reflections with you.

The vocation of Peter is a response to the invitation of Jesus who gave him « the keys of the Kingdom. » (Matt. 16:16-18) As for Paul, who probably never met Jesus face to face and was a persecutor of the Church, his conversion came from a vision on the road to Damascus. Peter was nicknamed the Apostle to the Jews while Paul was known as the Apostle to the Gentiles. Even if Peter and Paul were not always in agreement during their life time, they were in their death. That is why the Church honors them together.

They were placed close to the Virgin Mary in the list of saints since the early history of the Church. It is on account of them that the Church is called one, holy, catholic and apostolic.

I believe that it is very significant to have the celebration of the Oblates on this day. In the past, in order to attain holiness, baptized persons were called to flee the world in order to consecrate themselves to God. Neither Peter nor Paul made this type of separation from the world. They identified themselves as they were and evangelized the whole world with the Spirit of Jesus. They were simply themselves. Peter with his faith, strengths and weaknesses. Paul with all of himself. Even if they were not always in agreement, they remained faithful to themselves. They could have argued at the level of ideas and human concepts but in regard to the faith the two left a lasting treasure to the whole Church.

Why were they able to be such great legends in the Church? What did they do that their apostolate was so unique? Firstly, they discerned their call from who they were. Secondly, they had an experience of Jesus and the Good News according to their personality. In other words, Jesus traversed their life while respecting them.

This is important for us today. We are called to consecrate our life in the world today. We have to discern deeply our vocation. We have to experience the charism and the spirituality left to us by our Founder, Father Parent, by making them our own. We are living a profound experience of secular consecration. In this way, we should be able to pass on to the universal Church and to the world what we are and what we have.

How do we achieve our call and our experience of Jesus? First of all, I want to bring to your attention the question that Jesus addressed to his disciples in the Gospel: « Who do you say I am? » The reply from Peter is: « You are the Messiah . . . the Son of the living God. » (Matt. 16:16) He was completely certain about what he said. He replied with conviction and with a deep faith. Jesus responded to him

with swiftness in saying: « Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. » That is Peter! What about Paul? He gave a witnessing of his own life with pride and assurance. He expressed his faithfulness to his vocation in Christ Jesus that we find in the reading of this feast day: « I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness which the Lord the righteous judge will give me on that day . . . »

The Church marks today the feast of Saint Peter and Paul who are examples for us, asking us who is Jesus for us? Can we say with conviction that we have run the race according to our own vocation? In order to respond, it is necessary to reflect upon our 2nd five. Through our life of presence of God, we can look at each person with positive eyes and without criticizing them. We are going to live all realities with a good regard without ever complaining about them. Like the Virgin of the Annunciation, we will be available to render all kinds of service. Finally, we will feel full of joy for who we are in recognizing Jesus present in us and in others while living a life of peace in the presence of God within the reality of the present moment. This here is going to create an atmosphere of peace wherever we will be living.

On this celebration day of the Oblate Institute, let us pray with Father Parent to give us the grace to live our charism and spirituality and to pass them onto others through our exemplary lives in the midst of the world.

The reality of the present moment...

Pope Francis has made his first international visit as a pontiff to Brazil for the world youth day and attracted more or less three millions of young Catholics from all over the world. His visit has really provoked lots of questions to many people throughout the world despite of religious beliefs. His approaches and attitudes have even pushed many of them to look differently towards Catholic Church. When the whole world is reacting, I feel that if I am not reacting I fail in living the Charism of our Institute.

In the past three decades, the Catholic Church has lost millions of followers to smaller Christian denominations. Why? Are we the Catholics not leading an exemplary life? Were he preaching and actions not always going hand in hand by many? Were we not ready to accept and acknowledge our own mistakes and not ready for changes within ourselves? On the whole were we not convinced of the Gospel to proclaim and practice it even though we have committed ourselves to God in different ways? Have we failed in several ways to transmit our faith? What is the truth?

By this international visit, Pope Francis challenges the consecrated persons by saying "We cannot keep ourselves shut up in parishes, in our communities, when so many people are waiting for the Gospel outside in the world". He invites the entire baptized not to be afraid to go and to bring Christ into every area of life, to the fringes of society, even to those who seem farthest away, most indifferent. He further says that the Lord seeks all; he wants everyone to feel the warmth of His mercy and His love. He has shown this by actions of simplicity and love in all what he spoke during his visit. He visited the slum in Rio and the hospital of St Francis of Assisi where the recovering drug addicts are taken care of. He urged everyone to hold the hand of the one in need, of the one who has fallen into the darkness of dependency perhaps without even knowing how, and he insisted that we must say to him or her: 'You can get up, you can stand up'. Towards the end of his visit he even said "If a person seeks God and has good will, who am I to judge him?" Such beautiful gesture of love and exemplary life of our simple pope, has made a person from a Christian Denomination, who has come in protest against his visit as a Catholic Leader, to say: "Pope Francis, I'm an Evangelical, but I love you and I want to listen to you just the same."

As a Voluntas, how do I react to the gospel in the reality of the present moment? Whole world is reacting to all what Pope has done during his first international visit regardless of religious beliefs. What about me? How do I discern my Charism in the light of the Gospel?

Is it always possible to be thankful and happy?

I have thought this time to share with you a question that dwells in my spirit and returns often since the day I read the following text: « Be happy at all times; pray constantly; and for all things give thanks to God, because this is what God expects you to do in Christ Jesus. » (1 Thess. 5:16-18) Is it always possible to be thankful and happy? I am certain that you can pose this question to yourself from time to time.

Each one of us lives in space and in time. We are confronted with different realities and situations in our daily life. We traverse valleys, mountains, footpaths and straight and narrow ways. I continue to make efforts to put this into practice in my life. Is it always possible to be thankful and happy? This is a constant seeking in my spiritual journey. What do you think of it? Do you pose to yourself the same question? Do you strive also to find a good response? Let us seek all together the happiness and glory of God. Let us all try to become holy and as Father Parent would say: « let us not lose time. »

The New Evangelization

We are approaching towards the end of the year of faith. One of the most important aspects of faith today is the new evangelization which calls each of us to deepen our faith in response to the new challenges of contemporary world. New evangelization is a prophetic and revolutionary calling not only for those with special vocations, missionaries or priests but also to every baptized person. Entire people of God are invited to renew the relationship with Jesus Christ and His Church. As Benedict XVI said, the centrality of the new evangelization is focused on re-proposing Jesus Christ and His gospel to all who experience a crisis of faith due to secularization. It is the proclamation of Jesus and His gospel to everyone by everyone with the conviction of "a personal and profound meeting with the Savior".

We live because it is a free gift from God. God created all of us in His own image and likeness (Gn. 1:27). We lost the status of freedom but He did not want anyone of us to be perished. Church continuously reminds all of us to feel the need and proclaim our faith in our families, workplaces and parishes and in our own milieu.

Expectations of Jeam Life

Dear Voluntas Members,

We are in the process of reflection and trying to live our team life. Father Parent speaks about seven requirements that invite Voluntas in keeping the spirit of team life:

- 1. Selflessness
- 2. Fusion of ideas
- 3. Fusion of formation
- 4. Acceptance of group spirit
- 5. Acceptance of common objectives
- 6. Coordination of the efforts of all
- 7. Faithfulness to authentic discipline

Team life requires the refusal of demanding one's rights, the contribution of the qualities of each one for the team and the acceptance of the faults of others and difficulties. Father Parent states moreover that each one must develop a positive attitude in order to reveal his/her thoughts and ideas concerning a problem and ready to renounce his/her ideas and point of vue whether accepted or rejected by the team.

The team is a fusion of the efforts of everyone and no one is permitted to provoke dissensions in the midst of the team. Each is called not to have either criticism or suspicion towards others and prejudices during team meetings.

According to Father Parent, teams can be formed in all realms but we must concern ourselves with persons wishing to become sincere wills of God.

The Father Founder awaits for what I cite:

We must orient our thoughts in the same direction.

We must work together.

We must support one another.

We must be concerned for one another.

We must loyally accept responsibilities.

We must love one another and speak of our love.

We must share our ideas and reflect together.

We must support the weakest.

We must sacrifice ourself for the others in order to live our team life. That is why as members of the Institute, we can make the resolution to better live team life by saying:

- We seek solutions to our problems together.
- We develop initiatives together.
- We share our ideas, passions, self-discipline and our humility.
- We listen patiently to the words of others in the hope of cultivating the team.

Valentine's Day

The month of February is famous for Saint Valentine. Saint Valentine lived close to 270 years before Jesus Christ. At that time, Emperor Claudius II had announced an interdiction of marriage in order to send more young men into combat in the army. At that time, Valentine was marrying in secret young engaged couples. In learning about this, the emperor had him tortured and executed. Other versions exist, but what comes back the most is the fact that he was executed because he wanted to preserve « love, » the same love of God at the time He created the human person, the same love that Jesus brought to the world by giving His life for us. February 14th recalls and commemorates the devotion of Saint Valentine to love.

With time, this feast became a commemorative date for lovers, a day dedicated to those who love each other, and it is celebrated throughout the world. There are more than a billion cards exchanged on this day. In the exchange of wishes, this feast day is only second to Christmas; all of this for the love that people want to share with those closes to them. What does this love represent? Pure Love begins primarily through the eyes, a physical aspect; then through acceptance we learn to know the other; then comes appreciation through which we feel good in the company of the other and share moments of life together; at last comes the pleasure of being with this person. This brings a unique connection, emotional, physical, moral, psychological and spiritual. A deep and sincere love cannot disappear. This love becomes an intimate relationship that responds to expectations, founded on respect and trust. This unites the parties so that they are one. Nothing outside can fade this connection that welds these two together.

As Voluntas, married or celibate, where am I with love? How can I bring my love, a deep and sincere love, toward myself, my loved ones and God? This is the challenge that we are called to live every day.

Pope Francis discourse to the members of Secular Institutes

On May 10, 2014 members of secular Institutes met with Pope Francis. He gave a wonderful speech resuming the whole history of secular consecration. It is a great gift to all of us who are called to live this challenging mission. Father Parent has already given us this secular consecrated life. We are fortunate to have this vocation which is always relevant for today. Pope's reflection would help us to deepen our consecration. I invite you to read, reflect and make it yours in your milieu. Here is the original text of Pope Francis:

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

I welcome you on the occasion of your Assembly and greet you by saying: I know and I appreciate your vocation! It is one of the newer forms of consecrated life recognized and approved by the Church, and perhaps one that is not yet fully understood. Do not be discouraged: you are part of that poor and outward reaching Church that dreams!

By vocation you are laity and priests like others in the midst of others, you lead an ordinary life, without outward signs, without the support of a community life, without the visibility of an organized apostolate or specific works. Your only wealth is the all-encompassing experience of love of God and for this you are able to know and share life's trials in their many forms, maturing them with the light and power of the Gospel.

You are a sign of the Church in dialogue spoken of by Paul VI in the Encyclical Ecclesiam suam, "Since the world cannot be saved from the outside, we must first of all identify ourselves with those to whom we would bring the Christian message-like the Word of God who Himself became a man. Next we must forego all privilege and the use of unintelligible language, and adopt the way of life of ordinary people in all that is human and honorable. Indeed, we must adopt the way of life of the most humble people, if we wish to be listened to and understood. Then, before speaking, we must take great care to listen not only to what men say, but more especially to what they have it in their hearts to say. Only then will we understand them and respect them, and even, as far as possible, agree with them. Furthermore, if we want to be men's pastors, fathers and teachers, we must also behave as their brothers. Dialogue thrives on friendship, and most especially on service. All this, we must remember and strive to put into practice on the example and precept of Christ." (n.87)

The theme of your Assembly, "At the heart of human events: the challenges of a complex society", points to the scope of your mission and your prophecy. You are in the world but not of the world, carrying within you the essentials of the Christian message: the Father's love that saves. You are in the heart of the world with the heart of God.

Your vocation makes you interested in every individual and his or her deepest issues that often remain unspoken or masked. By virtue of the love of God that you have encountered and known, you are capable of closeness and tenderness. So you can be so close as to touch others, their wounds and expectations, their questions and needs, with a tenderness that is an expression of care that erases all distance like the Samaritan who walked by and saw and had compassion. This is the movement to which you have committed your vocation: to journey alongside each person and be close to every person you meet; because your being in the world is not simply a sociological condition, but it is a theological reality that calls you to be aware, to care for, recognize, see and touch the flesh of your brethren.

If this does not happen if you become distracted, or worse still, do not know this contemporary world but know and visit only the world that you are more comfortable with or more drawn to, then conversion is urgently needed! Yours is an outward reaching vocation by nature, not only because it brings you to others, but also because it asks you to live where every man lives.

Italy is the country with the largest number of secular institutes and members. You are a yeast that can produce good bread for many, the Bread of which there is so much hunger: someone to listen to people's needs, desires, disappointments, hopes. Like those who have preceded you in your vocation, you can restore hope to young people, help the elderly, open roads to the future, spread love in every place and in every situation. If this does not happen, if your ordinary life lacks witness and prophecy, then, I repeat to you, there is an urgent need for conversion!

Never lose the momentum of walking the streets of the world, aware that walking, even with an uncertain step or limping, is always better than standing still, locked within your questions or securities. The missionary passion, the joy of Christ that urges you to share with others the beauty of faith, reduces the risk of becoming stuck in individualism. The line of thought that proposes man as creator of himself, guided only by his own choices and desires, often vested in the seemingly beautiful garment of freedom and respect, threatens to undermine the foundations of consecrated life, especially of lay people. There is an urgent need to re-evaluate your sense of belonging to your vocational community which, precisely because it is founded on community life, finds its strengths in its charisma. For this reason, if each of you is a precious opportunity for others to meet with God, it is about rediscovering the responsibility of being prophecy as a community, to seek together, with humility and patience, a word of sense that can be a gift for the country and for the Church, and to bear witness to it with simplicity. You are like antennas ready to seize the seeds of innovation prompted by the Holy Spirit, and you can help the ecclesial community to take on this gaze of goodness and find new and bold ways to reach all peoples.

Poor among the poor, but with a burning heart never still, always on the move. Together [in community] sent out [into the world], even when you are alone, because your consecration makes you a living spark of the Church. Always on the road with the virtue that is of pilgrims: joy!

Thank you, dear friends, for what you are. May the Lord bless you and Mary keep you. And pray for me!
