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
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FROM THE EDITORS ...

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
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FROM THE DIRECTOR GENERAL

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still have the Bible I used as a student in theology. I can't decide to get rid of it even if I have several other, more recent translations in my possession. This Bible, though, is more than a memento. Every time I open it to read the Word of God, I feel once again the enthusiasm that was mine, at the thought of being a priest. Inside the cover I wrote down the following reference: 1 Kings 19:9-19, and Luke 24:13-35. In my Scripture courses, these two references had caught my attention. There is reference, here, to God who is present in the simplest things: a tiny, whispering sound, and God who journeys with us on the path of life.

In celebrating the Institute's fifty years I was reminded of my own coming to the Institute. At the time I wanted to be a priest, I felt God calling me in the deeper reaches of my heart. However, I was hesitating between community life and the diocesan clergy, until the day when Father Gaston Laroche, my former teacher at the Trois-Rivières minor seminary, told

me: "Why don't you come to our Institute?" It was then that I felt God inviting me there! It is God who calls, but He chooses us to challenge others.

There is nothing nostalgic about taking my seminarian's Bible to celebrate the Institutes 50th anniversary. Quite the opposite: both rekindle in me the flame that marked my beginnings in the Institute. It is at times like these that I realise how secular consecration is wonderful. It is so because since my joining the Institute I have met wonderful people, but especially because I think that God is wonderful as He shows himself in simplicity, and because He is



wonderful to continue walking with us on the path of life here in Canada as elsewhere.

We celebrated our golden anniversary throughout the Institute. This Journal gives you a bird's-eye view of the local festivities. I thank all those who were involved. I hope that, for you, too, this celebration be an occasion of renewal. Each one of us must take up the torch lit by Father Parent in 1958. Just as in a relay race, he has passed on to us the spirituality he received from the Holy Spirit, and now it is our turn to continue the race... that is, we must now, in turn, invite young men and mature ones, as well as couples, to join us. This will be easy if we believe

that secular consecration is wonderful.

We are already getting ready for the 2010 Assembly General, to be held in Québec City in June of that year. The local directors have already been consulted by the steering committee for the assembly content, and results have already been tabled before

the central council. As a consequence of these consultations, the council retained the following theme: SECULAR CONSECRATION, and the following sub-themes shall be added: formation, commitment to poverty, the service of authority, and openness to other categories of members. Some of you shall be asked shortly to be part of the assembly general: I urge you to be generous in your response. It is together as an assembly, and moved by the Holy Spirit, that we build up our Voluntas Dei Institute.

Everyone is called upon to offer prayer. This, too, is a way of taking part in the assembly. The assembly is




Let us spend the remainder of life in an attitude of thanksgiving, as we consider that greater things are still to come.

n Saturday, July 5, 2008, we solemnly celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of foundation of the Voluntas Dei Secular Institute at the shrine of Our Lady of the Cape. The celebration began with a trumpet blast and a crier proclaiming: "Oyez! Oyez, good people!" Then followed a brief



history of the life and work of Father Louis-Marie Parent, O.M.I., who founded the Voluntas Dei Institute on July 2, 1958. This was followed by the choir singing the song composed by Robert Lebel, for the occasion, while the procession bearing the flags of the different countries where the Institute is, got under way.

The Eucharistic celebration was presided by Bishop Martin Veillette of Trois-Rivières. The concelebrants were François Hamel, director general of the Institute, and André Côté, Canadian District director. We were honoured with the presence of Bishop François Thibodeau, C.J.M. of Edmundston, N.B., Bishop Dorylas Moreau of Rouyn-Noranda, Québec, Bishop Eugène Tremblay of Amos, Québec, Emeritus Bertrand Blanchet Archbishop of Rimouski, Québec, and Father Charles-Émile Anctil, representing the Bishop of Ste-Anne-de-la-Pocatière.

About 100 Voluntas Dei priests as well as several other clergy filled the basilica sanctuary.

The celebration was a success, the assembly being most attentive and recollected. Texts from the Apostle Paul (1 Cor. 12:4-28) –"The gifts of grace are varied." – and of Matthew (5:13-16) – "You are the salt of the earth." – were chosen for the occasion. In his homily the director general François Hamel highlighted the essential values of the Institute and stressed those of authenticity and hope. You will find the text of this homily in the present edition of *The Present Moment*.

At the prayers of the faithful, we offered to the Lord the Institute and its pioneers, and the Oblate Missionaries of Mary Immaculate who were collaborators of the first hour. A world globe was brought with the offertory procession as a symbol of all the members of the Institute: priest, single laymen, seminarians, and married couples who answered the call to join the Institute in different parts of the world. At the memento of the dead, the register of deaths was deposited at the foot of the altar.



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
This Mass of Thanksgiving allowed us to joyfully commemorate the historic moment of Father Louis-Marie Parent's foundation, and this was cause for intoning the Magnificat at the end of the Eucharistic celebration.

The celebration was followed by the banquet, at which the following addressed the gathering: Father Mario Laroche, director general emeritus (1980-1992), representing Father Parent at the head table, Bishop Martin Veillette of Trois-Rivières, Father François Hamel, director general, and Father André Côté, director of the Canadian District. A few former members of the Institute who had lived at Trois-Rivières (La Salette) at the beginning of the Institute were also present at the festivities. Stories and recollections of the early years enriched the conversation.

Everyone present will long remember this beautiful celebration that was held near the birthplace of the Voluntas Dei Institute.

Homily, 50th Anniversary

W e are here today to celebrate the Voluntas Dei Institute's golden jubilee. Fifty years ago – on July 2, 1958, actually – Father Louis-Marie Parent gathered a group of young men and together they founded the Institute. Father Parent's action was in direct response to a request of his superior general Father Leo Deschâtelets who had asked him to found a secular institute for men, with the same spirituality as that of the Oblate Missionaries of Mary Immaculate that he – Father Parent – had founded in 1952.

Father Parent has given pride of place to living the present moment, making it an essential value for us to develop. So, how should we be celebrating the

past? There is no question of looking back and regretting the good old days, nor to look ahead and live in a dream world when everything will be possible. We must keep in mind that the past dies at each moment and the future springs forth. We must be

prepared to serve, as the Gospel says. We do not have only to recall and tell the story of the beginnings in 1958, but we have to create a great story today.

On this day we do not only want to look back on something that took place fifty years ago. What we want is to carry out in the present moment the spirituality that Father Parent gave us. The years gone by are like the furnace where our spirituality has been tested and shown to be tried and true. This is the spirituality we know as "the spirituality of the Three Fives." This strength of our spirituality is seen especially in the "Second Five": • Presence of God

- Absence of criticism
- Absence of complaint
- Being of service
- Being peacemakers.

We live this spirituality in our secular consecration, that is, through living the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience in the midst of the world. Saint Thomas Aquinas says that grace builds on human nature. To paraphrase this great theologian, I would say that our spirituality should be like second nature to us. We each have our own personality, our own identity, with their ups and downs. We are rooted in

our families where we grew up and developed. And when we joined the Institute we added a spirituality to what we already were. This spirituality of the 5-5-5 was grafted on what we already were, and it continues to change us today, in the present

moment. We are sons and daughters of the earth, but we are also children of God.

When we look at the world we live in, we must realise that all is not perfect. This brings to mind our members in Sri Lanka who are living in a country devastated by civil war. This also brings us to mind our members in Haiti who live in dire poverty and in a difficult social context. It also brings to mind the members in Colombia who also experience social troubles. I think of the confreres in Laos and Cuba who are not as free as they should be. Even here in North America, we are marked with religious relativism and over-consumption. What can we do at this historic moment where God has placed us? The

"Christ refused to tamper with consciences and he never forced anyone to follow him." answer lies perhaps less in the doing and more in the being.

What our world needs is HOPE. To celebrate 50 years of existence is to live the present moment with the men and women we encounter every day. Hope must not only characterise us, but we must have a passion for it. We believe in the Word of God, so we must make this Word a part of our lives. Our lives are a sacred history because we read it each day in the light of faith. We acknowledge that God is present and that He is our partner.

He is a partner who comes to us bearing gifts. He gives personal charisms to each one of us. We must look at ourselves HONESTLY. It seems to me that the first scared text we heard speaks of this. The

Voluntas Dei Institute has no special work to gather us together around a common apostolic objective. If we live in the Institute it is because we want "to be, in the manner of the Virgin of the Annunciation, the instrument of Christ carrying out the will of the Father." This is what draws us. Saint Paul compares the Church to a human body, and he urges

us to respect what we are, with our qualities and our weaknesses. A human body that would be all hands or feet or mouth or eyes would not be human and could not survive. And if it happened that we were to amputated a member of the body, then we would realise how important it was.

Each one of us is a member of the Body of Christ, we are a part of the Church, as are members, parts of the Institute. The team life that is one of our basic values helps us accept one another as different, and see one another as gifts of the Spirit.



Being honest with ourselves also brings us to be authentic real. In his 1996 encyclical on the religious life, Pope John Paul II called on consecrated people to be authentic, to be real. This is what he says: "Do not forget the charisms which have shaped remarkable "seekers of God" and benefactors of humanity, who have provided sure paths for those who seek God with a sincere heart... Does not this world of ours need joyful witnesses and prophets of the beneficent power of God's love? Does it not also need men and women who, by their lives and their work, are able to sow seeds of peace and fraternity?" (*Vita consecrata*, 108).

Christ witnessed to the truth, but he did not want to force it on anyone. He refused to tamper with consciences, and he never forced anyone to follow him. He was TRUE and authentic to the very last,

trusting in the Will of the Father.

The world and the Church look for true witnesses, for men and women who are authentic, real. Young people today are demanding, they do not let themselves be controlled. They want to see in us what they cannot see elsewhere. If we are true and authentic, they will

want to join us.

What I want to leave you with today, as we celebrate the golden jubilee of the Institute, is that hope and truth should be the two pillars that should support us in living our secular consecration, that is, consecration in the midst of the world.

Our gratitude to Father Parent – "God's mailman," as he calls himself. He has delivered the message of the Holy Spirit to several of us.


Our gratitude to the Church, for her confidence in us.

The year 2008 marked the golden anniversary celebration of the Voluntas Dei Institute's foundation. In response to a request by the Director General and his council, the district was pleased to take part in the preparation of the festivities. All the sectors (7 of them) were invited to celebrate in a special way this jubilee of the Institute, either with a eucharistic celebration, a meal together, or a special meeting.

On July 4, many members of the Canadian District met together at Trois-Rivières, the seat of our foundation, and more specifically at the shrine of Our Lady of the Cape, in the shadows the Basilica. The Annual of Congress Committee looked after the decorations. flowers, posters, and balloons. A Memory Room with memorabilia and photos, draw the attention of the attendees. At 2:00 P.M., the Canadian District director welcomed everyone and invited all present to join in the anniversary theme song Pour bâtir la paix ("To build Peace"), composed



by Robert Lebel. Then the director presented a report of the district and sector activities for 2007-2008.

At 2:45, after a short break, the master of ceremonies Jean-Guy Brillon invited all the district directors present to share the important highlights of their mandates. Each one expressed himself according to his personality, and it was a captivating time! For some, it was a reflection on our history, and for others, it was a better understanding of the stages of growth of the Institute and of the influence of our spirituality on persons and groups.

This is the list of our directors since 1972: 1972-1974, Léon Robichaud; 1974-1982, Arthur Beaulieu; 1982, Marcel Forest (interim director); 1982-1991, Jean-Paul Chiasson; 1991-1995, Michel Villeneuve; 1995-2003, Marc-André Lafrenière, and 2003 until now, André Côté.

Like at every family gathering, all the members of the district received a "surprise gift": for the priests and deacons it was a stole with the Institute's insignia, for the laymen it was an icon of Christ the Redeemer, and the married couples were given an icon of the Holy Family.

At 4:30 P.M. the eucharistic celebration was presided by Mario Laroche, director general emeritus, and one of the institute's founding members. The homily, based on scriptural references and articles of our Constitutions that inspired his theme song, was given by Robert Lebel. At the offering we presented to the Lord all those who celebrate in 2008 an anniversary, to the priesthood, marriage, of joining the Institute. At the *Memento*, the deceased members of our district were named and were part of our prayer.



Following the eucharistic celebration, the festivities continued around a glass of wine followed by dinner where joy and fellowship were palpable. And to close the evening, the group *Un brin de Paradis* ("A Bit of Paradise") brought freshness and youth to the assembly as they entertained the members with song and reflection on life, fellowship, and peace.

A thank you to everyone for having joined in the celebration. May the feast continue!

INTERVIEW WITH FR. MARCOS GUERRA

Father Marcos is director of the house of formation, at Pan de Azúcar, some 20 kilometres from La Serena.

What is the mission of the new house of formation?

The seminarians here are at the initial stage of their formation (aspirancy) in the Institute and are taking preuniversity studies. They live a year that is especially devoted to pastoral work and to the study of the Institute's spirituality.

What is your view of the Institute's 25 years in Chile, from the vantage point of the house of formation?

The Institute is now experiencing an increase in numbers, in Chile. I think that this is very good, and with the new house of formation, we continue to move forward. For a while we had few young candidates, but thanks to God, we now have more.

What is your wish for the Institute, in Chile?

That the Voluntas Dei Institute continue to prosper in our country. We especially need priests for the Institute and for the Church. We must go forward. My role is to interest as many young people as possible in the charism of our Institute and make them want to spread the Gospel, to have hope, and to be peacemakers in the midst of the world.

NEWS:

Two single men and one couple have started a discernment process to join the Institute.

In April, a first vocation day was held in the house of formation. Five single men took part. These were the subjects discussed: the call to the priestly vocation, the call to consecrated celibacy as a layman, the spirituality of the Institute, the mission of the Institute.

The annual single consecrated men's meeting took place in June. The object of the meeting was to strengthen the bonds uniting us, and to reaffirm the sense of secular consecration wherever the celibate single men are, in Chile. \blacksquare


Cuba

The main celebration took place at the annual Summer Congress of the United States District-in-Formation. Marking the 50th Anniversary of the foundation of the Voluntas Dei Institute we began our Congress this year with a 3-day retreat (Tuesday to Thursday noon – August 5-7) at Daylesford Abbey in Paol, Pennsylvania. The Abbey (Norbertine Community) has been the sight of our Summer Congress for the past several years and has proved to be a very conducive place for prayer and our summer gathering. There were approximately 30 members present for the retreat. When the Summer Congress began on Thursday over 80 people participated. This has been the largest gathering of the Institute in the United States.

The Congress began with a special prayer service commemorating our foundation and a special blessing with holy water for all present. The Icon of the Annunciation was enthroned as it is for all our gatherings. Each evening of the Congress had a special celebration – with the 4 couples from Trinidad providing a special musical entertainment. The Trinidadians also provided all the liturgical music during the retreat along with Deacon Joel Livingston on the organ.

On Friday evening following Mass there was a very special served dinner and the cutting of the 50th Anniversary cake. At the tables there were specially prepared centerpieces featuring a picture of Fr. Parent. Prayer cards with a prayer and photo of Fr. Parent served as a special favour at everyone's place at dinner.

Friday evening saw the special presentation in the Abbey atrium of Fr. 

The first team in Ethiopia was formed in March of 2004 in Addis Ababa, the country's capital city. The second team was formed in 2005 in the western part of the country, and a third team was formed in October of 2005 in Durame, in the southern part of Ethiopia.

On behalf of the teams in Ethiopia I would like to thank both of them for the work they have done, both spiritually, materially, and financially. We appreciate above all their visits to us in Ethiopia. Special gratitude to Fr. Michael for his four visits to us over a short period of time, to encourage us in being the hidden leaven in the midst of the world, especially in Ethiopia, in order to bring the Good News to our brothers and sisters by witnessing to Christ.



The Voluntas Dei Institute Spirituality helps us:

walk under the grace of God;

realise that we are present under the grace of God the Almighty One;

gives us new birth in the Spirit of God, to serve and live in the midst of the world.

We are fully aware of our call to be peacemakers through living a life of unconditional love in action in the midst of the world.

The Anniversary of the Voluntas Dei Institute reminds us to reflect more and more on the needs of the destitute, the marginalised and ostracized brothers and sisters, especially the abandoned elderly people. The day after our establishment, our team started serving the poor older persons living on street corners, with financial support from Father Michael. The Institute opened a Feeding Centre (Michael's House) for these poor, older people, and we are now serving over 100 of them by providing basic needs such as food, medical care, shelter and shower facilities, and money. The food programme is five days a week, Monday to Friday. Since our teams are located in three main areas, we offer cash transfer services in Durame, Dembi Dollo, and Debreziet. We are now serving over 600 destitute people.

Our outstanding mission is to transform the world from within by living the Gospel in our professional, social and cultural milieus; in this way, we are light and hidden leaven in the midst of the world.

At our celebrations we praised God by singing songs of happiness and thanksgiving for the great deeds of God for His people, by repeating "Halleluiah" and "Amen." These are very high points of our celebration of Voluntas Dei Institute Anniversary, of the 50 years of spiritual journey since its foundation.

At the celebration we have recommitted ourselves, offering our total life by presenting ourselves fully to the guidance of Holy Spirit, by living the earthly reality in true obedience and total dedication.

The theme of our celebration was: "Let us go out into the world and do some good, reach out to others and do some good, reach out to and help the vulnerable older persons by being kind and generous, and together we all make the world a better place."



Do hereby decree



THE LAOTIAN MARTYRS

The official adventure of the process of beatification of the Laotian Martyrs officially began June 12, 2008, at Nantes, France. One of the martyrs was a member of the Institute, Luc Si.

Luc was the baby from a family of six, two girls and four boys. He was born in 1938. He was baptised October 28, 1951, along with Louis Ling, the actual Bishop of Paksé, Laos.

In 1961 there was a coup d'état in Laos, and Luc was forcefully drafted into the army. In 1967 he married Nang Sôt, and together they had a daughter who is now deceased.

Luc was an associate member in the Institute, and had started his probation January 26, 1970, at the time Father Parent was in Laos; it was at this time that Father met the new probationers. Luc was also a catechist.




On March 3 (1970), Deacon Louis Ling directed the retreat at Honey Phong, an out of the way village, and Luc was one of the retreatants.

On March 5, Louis and Pho Inpèng went to Dène Ding to meet families that wanted to become Christians. Luc told Louis: "I am very happy to have made this retreat. Now I am really ready...".

They left the village March 7, 1970. They came across an army truck that accepted to take them aboard. Along the way they were ambushed. Luc Si and Pho Inpèng were killed. Louis was wounded. The attackers stole the contents of the truck and the bags, set fire to the truck, and left. Luc was "really ready!"

"He died for Christ... had wanted to reach the isolated Christians, those who had no one to talk to them about Christ. He knew full well that it was dangerous, but he didn't want to abandon them any longer."

Declaration

I, François Hamel, the undersigned, priest, Director General of the Voluntas Dei Institute, declare the following to serve whomever it may concern, in the cause of canonisation of Luc Si, presumably martyred in Laos (cause of the "Laotian Martyrs").

According to the archives of the Institute, Luc Si, a Kmhmu catechist was born in 1938 in Laos, and was married;

- 1. Incorporated in the Institute as an associate member probationer, at a ceremony that took place January 26, 1970
- 2. Died in Laos March 7, 1970.

The Institute considers probationers dying during their period of probation full-fledged members in a spiritual, non canonical sense.



As I sat in the shade of a giant pine, on a radiant and warm summer day, my spirit started meditating on "the present moment," God's expectations, though virtual but real and infinite, and of which the present moment given to us is redolent.

The expression "present moment" evokes in us a spontaneous image of a pause, a second look, a reflective looking back of wisdom applied, and re-applied. Our vearly publication "The Present Moment" bears its name, two words that are dear to Father Parent. Father was to collect, explore and celebrate together the varied experiences of our members who discover, apply and live out in different contexts our special charism of secular institute. In those parts of the world where they are, the members translate, explain and proclaim the Presence of God, His kindness, His calls and His rights, basing these on healthy values, on the legitimate dynamics of the host cultures, to carry them with the action of the Holy Spirit to an unimagined level of accomplishment. How do they achieve this, what are the challenges and joys, what solidarity do they expect from each member and of the Institute as a whole? Our young roots and growing traditions find their undeniable and indispensable vitality there. Besides, the Church expects no less from us

However, this priority given to life, to the lived experience of people and groups, does not dispense us from reflection on the basic elements of our spirituality. Quite the opposite. It is obvious that while feeding on experience – past or current – our calling and our mission demand constant and ever-more enlightened and deepened creativity. While it is not enough to simply repeat the past in the wake of a rather short-sighted literalism, legalism and fundamentalism, it is of the utmost importance that we be rooted in this experience in order to continue to invent with wisdom and appropriately. God's expectations for us certainly point in this direction, according to the writings of Benedict



XVI, John Paul II, and Paul VI, among others. To manage or administer (hence, to promote) a spiritual heritage concerning a moral person and, therefore, every single human composing this moral person, has nothing to do with material or economic administration, however sophisticated it may be. This task which is essentially missionary in the evangelical sense of the word, is carried out through a conscientious effort of constant exploration of virtualities, possibilities, and originalities of their fundamental charism(s), to situate them at the very edge of their creative dynamic, inventor of the future, like the prow of a vessel on the high seas. Or better, like a plant that grows and ever renews itself through the activity of its specific vitality.

The elementary wisdom of common sense already draws man, however ignorant he is, to call upon and value the watchful conscience of the present moment as the simplest path to happiness. The past is gone and leaves us powerless before it; the unforeseeable future escapes our grasp, too; only the present moment is alive in our hands as a gift, and it solicits our responsible freedom. This is the first level of perception and of general ethics about the present moment.

More deeply, psychology reminds us that the prudent man refuses the regressive attitude of living or taking pleasure in a morbid or narcissistic manner in the past, a source of psychological blockage and illness of the spirit. Also, being obsessed with the future is just as alienating to the one doing it in existential anxiety or out of fear of the unknown. The life-saving buoy of the present moment where one is fully can save man from drowning or suicide brought about by the inaction or the refusal to accept events in an adult, mature way. This is the second level of ethical wisdom.

Welcome, then, to the innovating horizon of inebriating freedom, a sober, ontological inebriation whose

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consequence is the possibility to make us "be" or "not be," to exist and build oneself at will and autonomously, despite everything and on every occasion, with the shining, psychic health of superior maturity and limitless, blessed responsibility. At this level, the ethic of the common good works from the deepest layers of man and unfolds to him great horizons for the gift of self bent on excellence. At this point, the road to the country of the hero is opened.

Finally, theological experience and knowledge complete human being's ultimate, evangelical unity through the free exercise of theological faith, hope, and charity. Through the impetus of the Holy Spirit, the present moment can be charged with a tinge of eternity: By a spark of loving freedom, it is transmuted into immediate eternal life in a fascinating, continuous paschal adventure. It is here that human history under the direction of God unfolds in all its density. Like an ice cube that dissolves in warm water, time and eternity are now joined together in the theological love of Christ who said: "Whoever believes in me has eternal life, and I shall raise him up on the last day" (Jn. 6:47). Here we have reached the mystical level of knowledge and of divine, habitual love in the Father's family, the final possibilities to unfold in human experience and always available at the present moment. Only the meaning of this transcendence evangelises with discernment and makes the present moment Christian, beyond worldly culture, however developed it may be. This evangelical attitude ensures an undeniably effective missionary endeavour in the midst of the world, because it erects it into an active, actual sign of the risen Christ, like yeast in dough. Besides, it draws man away from pagan, selfish or abusive, epicurean ways and perceptions of the present moment - sadly, very common worldly attitudes stemming from a too limited knowledge of perspectives and possibilities that the present moment constantly opens to us. This marks the birth of the new creation, shown forth and growing, a realisation that triggers the reflex of a contemplative pause, one of wonder and of thanksgiving...

How can one best experience in a concrete way and from the vantage point of our daily spirituality, a spirituality of the Incarnation, whose dynamic is both secular and Christian, an extension of Christ's incarnation, and true will of God for a secular institute, in the Church? Here, then, in the present moment, the unexpected event of a state of intense awareness where God meets us and challenges us personally through His creative and sanctifying Love. Raised up so imperatively, our wills embrace the thrust of a superior, transparent, and oblative creativeness. Such seems to us the dynamics of God's expectation for us. The humble acceptance of these grace-filled, infinite, possibilities of the present in a perpetual act of giving birth (Cf. Rm. 8:19 and 22), completes the bearing of a past however gone by, and guarantees the better eternal future.

"Walk in my presence and be perfect," God said to Abraham. This culture of the living Presence of God, in us and then in the creating that it animates, in humankind that it gets into and Scripture that it inspires, is the great and deep secret of the present moment lived in the world in all its human denseness (human / divine), and in its long-lasting impact, both missionary and apostolic, on our human / cosmic environments. God always looks at people (and situations) as bearers of the future, from what they have the best in them, beyond all distress, because His gaze is one of love. This is the basic principle of a spirituality of the Incarnation.

This is surely a responsibility that challenges every true Christian, because man, even without knowledge of Christ, is loved by God; he already belongs to the order of salvation accomplished in Christ, and he is virtually on the way to Him, and is part of the people of God, the Body of Christ. He is destined to receive the fullness of the most secret vow with which animates him and which guides implicitly and mysteriously his quest, under the direction of the Holy Spirit. The images, symbols and traditions of his culture are an awkward expression of this reality. The mission of the people of God is to gather together all men, as they are and where they are, not through proselvtising but through dialogue and enlightened exchange, and the embodied witness of true love (see, here, Gaudium et Spes of Vatican II). It is the people of God's fundamental responsibility to root the presence and the mystery of Christ at the centre of the life and culture of all nations, so that "Every tongue proclaim to the glory of God the Father, that Jesus Christ is Lord" (Phil. 2:11).

Here we see the present moment as a multiple call to basic, fruitful vigilance that a famous mystic described thus: "He whose attitude is true finds himself everywhere and with everyone; but he who lacks rectitude is ill at ease in all places and with everyone. He who possesses God alone has no other thought than God himself. Such a man carries God everywhere and in all things, and that man's total activity takes on a divine character" (Meister Eckhart, Spiritual Conferences).

"O God, you are the God whom I seek... Thus have I gazed toward you in the sanctuary to see your power and your glory. For your kindness is a greater good than life; my lips shall glorify you. Thus will I bless you while I live; lifting up my hands, I will call upon your name" (Ps. 62). ■
